Question I: On 12th December 2024, WODC announced that the planning process at Salt Cross Garden Village has been temporarily paused. Whilst the net zero ambitions at Salt Cross are commendable, the lack of the 5 year housing land supply (5yhls) is leading to an explosion of unsustainable, car led, windfall development, without the necessary accompanying infrastructure, across the villages of West Oxfordshire. This is notable in my ward North Leigh where there have been 7 housing developments approved in as many years and a further 115	Councillor Sarah Veasey	Councillor Hugo Ashton, Executive Member for Planning	Salt Cross Garden Village (previously referred to as the Oxfordshire Cotswolds Garden Village) is allocated in the adopted Local Plan as a strategic location for growth (SLG) and is anticipated to provide around 2,200 new homes and 40 ha of new business space along with supporting community facilities. The detailed planning framework for Salt Cross is set out in the Salt Cross Area Action Plan (AAP). The AAP was submitted for independent examination in 2021 and in March 2023, the Inspector concluded that it was sound subject to a number of Main Modifications. However, following a subsequent successful legal challenge regarding the Inspector's conclusions on the AAP net zero carbon development policy, that part of the Inspector's report was formally quashed. The examination was re-opened in April 2024 and remains ongoing. In his most recent correspondence to the Inspector, the Head of Planning confirmed that a modified version of Policy 2 and updated evidence would be submitted by 18 March 2025.

In relation to the issue of 5-year housing land supply, it should be noted that because of the relatively long lead-in times associated with development of the scale of Salt Cross, whilst the delays with the AAP are frustrating, the actual impact of this on the Council's 5-year supply position is relatively minimal.

A total of 1,620 kgs (Approx 1.62 tonnes) of rubbish was collected during the work and information has been published on the council website.
